A Brand New School Year...Off and Running

Here we are with another school year up and running. I can assure you that the teachers here are up and running too. I watched them all prepare for the students. For two weeks before any students even walked in the door, the teachers were here working on bulletin boards and curriculum, and whatever else needed to be in place to make a classroom run smoothly.

The first day of school, all the teachers gathered at the front door, waiting for the students. Someone said, "Are we ready?" As soon as the doors opened, the hallways were filled with laughter and chatter and hugs for long missed teachers and students alike.

It was a rainy morning but that didn't take away from the

bright warmth that enveloped everyone who was part of that first morning at school. As the students walked in with book bags slung over their shoulders, clunking them into each other, there was a real sense of order and rightness about it all. It was a real contrast to see the tall eighth graders who seem to tower over many of the teachers, and the little kindergarten students. How do those little ones even remain standing with such giant book bags on their back? As they walked past me in the hall, they looked like walking back packs with little feet sticking out of them.

Many of us look for routine in our lives. We equate it to the rightness of it all. In a post September 11 world, routine is something that reassures us all. Much

has changed this past year. We watch the skies a little differently and we look at the world through a cautious eye. We find comfort in the things we know we can count on; family, friends, schools, and our faith. We have relied on those comforts from the time we were young.

One little student described it best for me last Spring when I was brand new as the development director here at St. Bernard's and still trying to meet everyone. I was talking to a kindergarten girl out in front of the building and she was telling me how much she liked St. Bernard's. When I asked her what she liked best, she answered without missing a beat, "Oh, I like the love." Now that's reassurance for you!

From the Principal : Mrs. Ellie Seward

Yes, a new name appears behind the title of "principal." I am Ellie Seward (Rollman), and I come to Omaha from Edmond, Oklahoma where I started a new Catholic School and I served as the principal for the past twelve years. I am originally from Humphrey, Nebraska, and I graduated from Creighton University and Wayne State College. I taught at Monmouth Park at 33rd & Ames for the first six years of my career, and then married and moved to Norfolk. (My husband is a college basketball coach.) After a few years, I served as a teaching principal at St. Mary's Catholic School in Wayne, and from there we moved to Ohio where I taught 4th grade. Coming back west we were located in Wichita, Kansas where I taught 7/8 grades at St. Francis. From there we made the move to Oklahoma where I taught 7/8 grades at Christ the King Catholic School in Oklahoma City before starting the new school in Edmond.

My school in Oklahoma is only twelve years old. The graduates

from that school are just finishing college, so I am a bit unfamiliar with addressing Alumni such as you from St. Bernard's. Some of my college friends are from this parish, and for some time I attended weekend liturgies here in the late 60's and early 70's. As a matter of fact, when I was married at St. John's at Creighton, the guitarist at my wedding was from St. Bernard's. Small world!

We have had a great start to the 2002-2003 school year. With some down-sizing due to enrollment, classes at several levels have been combined so they are generally larger. This provides a better mix of personalities and gives everyone a chance to find a "friend" who "fits" his/her personality. We are confident that with some changes in parental and student expectations, curriculum, and disciplinary action, our enrollment will increase and we will be in need of more classrooms in the future. With the tradition of St. Bernard's school and the distinctive quality of the staff, I am certain we can attract a student population eager to learn about their

Catholic traditions and practices and eager to meet top curriculum standards.

I am also aware of the St. Bernard's Capital Campaign. Liturgy is the primary work of the church so it seems only logical that major effort needs to go into restoring our place of worship. Yes, as a Catholic school, we spend a great deal of time stressing the importance of our faith and liturgical worship. Each week we attend two morning Masses. Beautifying our church will stress to our students the importance and significance of the perpetual presence of God.

I look forward to experiencing these challenges and wish to help in any way I can. I too encourage you to be a part of this giant restoration project. We are all working to further the Kingdom, and what better way than to beautify God's house!

Well, some things never change. Get those kids ready for the new school year and it seems the list of what it takes to go back to school is the same as it was when I was a grade-schooler. Ahemm...we won't say what year that was.

Oh, and don't forget those news school clothes: crisp uniforms and new socks and shoes. My mother had to iron all those pleats into the uniforms after each washing. Now those pleats are stitched in and the uniform skirts and pants go in the washer and dryer and look just right all the time. No matter how many times those uniforms get washed, they have enough polyester in them to make that "swish-swish" sound as the students walk down the hallways. When they are brand new, they almost sound like shower curtains moving down the hall. Combine that with the squeak-squeak of new shoes, and it is definitely a new school year. Maybe that explains why I always like to buy new shoes in the Fall. Some things never change.

The first day of school brought all those memories back to me. Once a person wears a Catholic School uniform, one never forgets the experience. Every once in awhile, when I look at a blank page of lined notebook paper, I can even remember writing "Hail Mary" at the top of it along with my name.

I am a product of Catholic Grade School. Can you tell? My parents sent eleven children through Catholic Grade School because they felt it was the best way for us to get a complete, solid education with a basis in faith and love of God. We went to school at the peak of the baby boom generation, with classic baby boomer birth dates from 1950 to 1965. Those years brought trials and tribulations to every family. We survived the

Cold War, the Beatles, Elvis, a President's assassination, women's lib, Woodstock, Vatican II, and disco. Final exams came and went at school and we prayed for divine intervention to help us pass, and somehow we moved from one grade to the next. We changed, however, the teachings of faith never changed.

What did we keep from it all? Old report cards, first grade art work, prayer cards, some black and white photographs...these are physical things we stored away. We have to blow the dust off them when we retrieve them from the top closet shelf.

However, our faith is still there, constant and close. I see it in the smallest of the kindergarten students here at Saint Bernard's. I have seen it in the eyes of the alums from the 1920's. When they came back for the reunion last winter, all they had to do was see a classroom full of desks and they were transported to their earliest of teachings. The eyes are all the same though: young or old, they are trained on the brightness of God. In a changing world and in a changing community, this faith is constant. It illuminates the path to the future and, more importantly, it is a bridge to the future.

The lessons learned in Catholic grade school last a life time. They help us to go forward in faith, not fear.

We hope you'll take advantage of the many opportunities to come back to visit St. Bernard's. The tradition here is so strong and we credit that to our alums.

For Generations To Come, Church Restoration Work Begins

Finally! It's really happening!

The excitement is building as the plans to restore St. Bernard's Church get underway. If you have the opportunity to drive by, you will be amazed at all the activity that is going on at the church. The General Contracting Firm of Lund Ross has scaffolding and yellow caution tape all over the place. Machinery is buzzing and beeping as it makes its way around the building, navigating to just the right spot to get

the work done. The work crew is currently tackling Phase One:

The repair and replacement of the clay roof tiles, and the sealing and repairing of the windows, and the exterior brick walls. The air conditioning and heating units will be replaced with

energy efficient units. Phase Two will restore the interior of the church to its original, beautiful Spanish Mission style.

The weather is cooperating and Phase One is progressing nicely. Every week a change is obvious. The work crew has

removed almost all of the clay tile and is making repairs to the underlayment. Seventy to seventy-five percent of the old clay tiles can be re-used, and some new tiles will be mixed in. The same company that repaired and restored the clay tile roof at St. Cecilia's Cathedral is working on the roof at St. Bernard's. The process of placing the tile back on the roof is soon to come.

A Capital Campaign is underway to raise the needed 1.8 million dollars. Parishion-

ers have generously pledged over \$600,000 for the first phase. Many alums have made donations to the Capital Campaign as well, and for that we are deeply grateful. Class Room Tidbits: The latest and the greatest!

Here's a sneak peak into the educational processes throughout the whole parish.

Music Class—Mrs. Nancy Gillpatrick. The kindergarten students are exploring the sounds around them, and which ones have a steady beat. First graders are discovering four types of voices: calling, talking, whispering and singing and how to use them appropriately. Second and third graders are thinking about cooler weather as they start to learn the songs for their Christmas program in December. Fourth, fifth and sixth graders are working with music notebooks. Seventh graders are beginning to study different types of meter and the eight graders are studying patriotic songs.

Technology Class—Mrs. Rita McKinney

Computer classes are off to a great start. All of the grades have reviewed the tools in Microsoft Word. The Draw program in Microsoft Word has been a big hit. The new programs are a challenge to many of the students. I look forward to a great year of teaching the students about computers and how to use them effectively in their school work.

Kindergarten—Ann Adkins

Kindergarten classes these days are much more than an easel, blocks, and the beloved house center. There is a computer and most of the children can use it competently. Science corner is now called "The Discovery Center". Instead of just magnets and shells, there are several generations of butterflies completing their life cycle in a special "butterfly box." On any given day you may find some of the older students visiting the kindergarten classes to work on cooperative learning skills. This helps build unity in our school. The children are also active in their religion classes and they visit the new chapel in the school for special prayer services. This is the tenth year St. Bernard's has offered an all-day kin-

dergarten program. Adjusting to first grade is certainly not the ordeal it used to be. One thing that never changes in a kindergarten classroom is the laughter and love as a group of children learns to share and learn together as a community of friends.

Religious Formation—Mrs. JoAnne Raleigh

Religious Formation classes began on September 8 with seventy-five students from fifty-four families. Ten catechists teach these students from preschool through eighth grade. From all walks of life, these catechists have answered a call from God to share their Faith with the next generation.

The students use the text from *Resources for Christian Living* because it challenges them to take their knowledge about Jesus and His teachings and put it into action in their lives. Every chapter asks "What difference does this make in our Church?" and "What difference does it make in my life?"

Each grade level invites the parents to attend one family class with them and each grade prepares special monthly prayer services for the School of Religion. We are also planning a special Advent Event for families.

RCIA—Mrs. Pat Malcolm

We have four people who are interested in joining the Catholic Church. Seven parishioners have agreed to act as sponsors for these people. On November 23 at the 5 P.M. Mass, the first of the RCIA rites will be held—the Rite of Acceptance. At this rite, the candidates are received into the order of catechumen.

Science—Mrs. Peyton

Seventh graders are raising cabbage white butterflies while learning to run a controlled experiment. Eighth graders have installed radon detectors in their homes and are learning about radiation in everyday life. Ann Adkins and Helen will present workshops

about connecting older students and younger students with each other in science class to other teachers at the Archdiocesan fall conference and at the Nebraska Association of Teachers of Science fall conference. Some seventh and eighth graders are making preparations for a class trip to Washington, D.C. in May. The students will lay a wreath at the tomb of the Unknown Soldier.

Second grade—Sr. Roselma Legault

With a good start we have completed our first chapter in Math with satisfactory work. We played "How To Be A Millionaire" to review for our first reading test. The first two weeks of school, the students were already asking to go to lunch by 9:40 in the morning. Most important for the second graders is preparation for Reconciliation and First Communion. Everyone is looking forward to receiving these sacraments.

First Grade—Mrs. Donna Molacek

The first day of school everyone was looking their best and ready to learn all the new things that first grade has to offer. The morning was getting a little long, but finally it was time for recess. GREAT! Time to play on the playground equipment. Wow! They put new stuff under the equipment to make the ground soft. They all wondered if they could still make it across the monkey bars. OUCH!!! Crash and burn. One was on the ground but there were no tears. The teacher had to tell her it was alright to cry. One broken arm and we hadn't even been in school two hours. At least she got a cool pink cast. One week later she was asking to go down the slide. First grade is always an adventure! At least we did not have anyone get locked in the bathroom at Mass. That is another story.

A Priceless Piece of History at Dinner Auction

One of our premiere items for this year's Dinner/Auction auction is an official United States Flag, which was to be flown over the Senate Building, especially for St. Bernard's on Labor Day, 2001. We auctioned it off in absentia last year because after it was flown, it was given to Ben Nelson to bring back to Omaha.

In the meanwhile, Sen. Daschle received a letter said to contain enough Anthrax spores to kill 300,000 people. The entire building, including Ben Nelson's office, was evacuated and closed and no one was admitted for approximately 4 1/2 months to allow for cleaning.

The highest bidder for the flag at last year's auction eventually gave up hope in ever receiving what was originally meant to be a Christmas gift and was given a refund. When the flag finally made its way to St. Bernard's (in late

April of this year) the bidder was given one last chance to re-buy the flag. She was unable to do so, so it was decided to hold the flag for this year's auction. A woman in the senate building who works in the department that flies the flags informed our contact that the office was running behind schedule and the flag was not flown on Labor Day as promised, rather it was flown on September 10, 2002 and was one of the last flags to be flown before the September 11th tragedy. There was an interminable period of time after the terrorist attack where flags were not flown for this purpose afterwards.

This flag has a very rich history. It does come with a certificate of authenticity with the date flown and the signatures of our state representatives, Beureter, Nelson, Osborne, Hagel, and Terry.

St. Bernard's Child Care: A loving home away from home

Did you even know that St. Bernard's has a day care? It started in June 2000, when the director of the preschool program, Diane Frizzell, was asked to also run an after school program. This program has grown in to a full year-round child care. Offering full day care since August 2000, there is a licensed capacity for 99 children, from infant to age twelve. Currently the day care is at capacity with a waiting list.

The day care provides a quality Christian program and curriculum, a safe clean environment, experienced staff, and continuing education that creates happy children who are loved in their home away from home.

Two preschool programs are offered: one

for child care and one for parents who do not need child care. Both programs offer Christian-based curriculum that is age appropriate. Special field trips are offered in the summer for the school age children. Through the summer, Preschool through school age are offered music, creative art, sports, and dance, with some programs carrying over during the school year. Diane and her dedicated staff strive to make each day enjoyable for the children so they will feel safe and comfortable and loved so that they will want to come back the next day. The Child Care helps St. Bernard's Parish meet the needs of the entire family.
